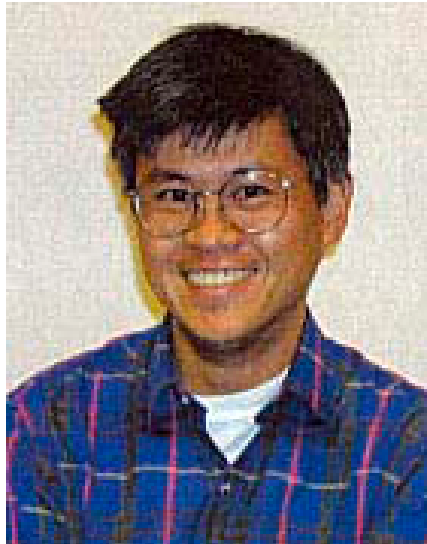

**Biography.** *Ph.D. Sociology, University of California – Santa Barbara (1994).* Former Visiting Professor at Wesleyan University. Research and Teaching focusing on the development of Asian American communities, race and ethnic relations, and the impact of religion on immigration. Current member and former President of the Association for Asian American Studies (1999 – 2002). Social Science Department Chair (1998 – 2002). My most recent publication is a manuscript titled: *On the Corner of Bliss and Nirvana: the Intersection of Religion, Politics and Identity in New Immigrant Communities* (forthcoming, 2008, Duke University Press) edited with Lois Lorentzen, Kevin Chun, and Joaquin Gonzalez.

**Activities.** As a Salzburg Fellow, I developed and taught a course on Global Citizenship to GATE (gifted and talented education) students at Sherman Oaks Community Charter School in San Jose. I am working with a Salzburg Scholar to modify this course and to offer it again in the future. In addition, I would like to modify and expand that course and to offer it in the Global Studies Program in the near future. I am a member of the Steering Committee for the Salzburg Program (2007 – current) and Chair the Selection Committee for 2008 Fellows.

**Interests.** To create study abroad opportunities for students and faculty in Southeast Asia and to help develop a global citizenship curriculum for SJSU. I am particularly interested in how to develop and facilitate global understanding in younger children and how globalization impacts their future.
